President's Message







Tech Notes - New Alfa Owners Internet Forum Replacing Yahoo Sites

Since the early days of Alfa motor homes, there have been a couple of vibrant forums on Yahoo where owners could exchange information and help each other resolve problems. Sadly, for some time now these forums have experienced serious technical problems which have made it more and more difficult to post and answer messages in a timely manner. There is some concern as to how long these forums will even continue to exist.

For these reasons, Dave Rypma recently established a new Alfa owners group on the website "groups.io." Several hundred members have already joined the new group, and the experience so far has been problem free and much smoother than was the case with Yahoo. Dave is working on migrating the message archive, files and other material from the Yahoo sites to the groups.io site.

If you are an Alfa motor home owner, the best thing you can do is join the "alfaseeya" group on groups.io now. Many of the top Alfa experts have stopped monitoring the Yahoo sites, so you need to go to the new site if you need help or just want to keep up with what is going on with Alfa motor homes.

To see the website and join the new group:

- In your web browser, go to https://groups.io/g/alfaseeya.
- When the AlfaSeeYa home page appears, scroll to the bottom and click the blue "Join this Group" button.
- On the next page, enter your e-mail address and follow the instructions.

Alternatively, you can join by simply sending an e-mail to alfaseeya@groups.io; put "sign me up for alfaseeya@groups.io" in the subject. Including your name is also a help. Once the moderators get your request, they will send you an 'invite' that contains a link; you click the link and you are a member.

Once you have joined, you have options for receiving messages from the group. To do this, click on "Subscription" on the left side of the group home page. You can receive each message as an individual e-mail, in groups of 12, or one e-mail summary per day. You can also set your preference to "special notices only"; if you do this, you will not see any member postings unless you visit the website.

Please note: the first message you send will be moderated (an anti-SPAM mechanism), so be patient for that first message to post! Following messages should be a lot faster than Yahoo Groups.

Tech Talk

Maintenance: main·te·nance (Noun) *The process of maintaining or preserving someone or something, or the state of being maintained.*

Alright, so I was asked to write a tech article, so this is what you are going to get. Maintenance, so what is it, how do you do it and how do we decide when to do it. Most of us understand maintenance of a vehicle: lubrication, oil filter, air filter, fuel filter, and of course, brakes.

But what about our Alfa's you ask. Surely you don't think our Alfa's need maintenance? To keep our Alfa's in tip top condition, there are a few things we need to learn and remember: Time, Sight, Smell, and yes even Hearing, are all we need to do for our maintenance.

Sight - well what about sight? Let's take a look at the batteries. Why are batteries needed inside our coach? The motorhome 12-volt system includes components that consume electrical power from the engine alternator, an inverter/charger, or one of three banks of batteries:

 <u>Automotive electrical components</u> like the instrument panel, headlights, turn signals, engine computers and driving controls are supplied power from the engine alternator or the chassis battery bank.

• <u>House electrical components</u> such as the furnace, refrigerator, A/C thermostat, stove, propane furnace, propane water heater, generator, lights, cigarette lighters and water pump are supplied by the house battery bank.



• The inverter batteries supply DC power to the inverter/charger (Xantrex) for conversion into 120-volt power for the microwave, visible wall receptacles and the entertainment system. The inverter is also a charger. When 120-volt power (generator/power pedestal) is available, it is capable of charging all the banks of batteries. The engine alternator charges the batteries while the chassis engine is running.

Time - what is time? It is a period based on days, weeks, months or even years.

Some items on our Alfas are required to be serviced once a year while other systems (example: our batteries) require monthly maintenance.

Batteries: to keep our batteries in tip top good shape required monthly maintenance. This maintenance requires us to check the water level, check for corrosion on the terminals, inspect for loose connections and bad terminals.

Low water, acid, loose connections will cause your batteries to deteriorate faster, and you will end up changing them in less than 5 years.

Corrosion, is formed when the batteries are off-gassing. This off gassing causes a green acid to appear on the terminals. As the acid is settling on the battery terminals, this causes the terminals to heat up, thereby creating a bad connection. This acid will eat away at the battery terminal. With this bad connection your batteries cannot receive a full charge from your charger. Eye sight is use to spot corrosion.

Do you know a loose connection can cause a terminal to heat-up? It can also cause the charger to get hot or even over-heat. A loose connection on a battery terminal will prevent your batteries from receiving a full charge. **Touch** is used to identify a loose connection.

Yearly maintenance items require our Alfas to be serviced once a year. Filters, oil and fuel, oil changes are required yearly. Both the generator and engine also require yearly maintenance.

Air filters, generator and engine based on OEM instructions should be changed out every 2 years.

Other items that require yearly maintenance;

 Water Heater, Electric/propane: Drain water tank and then repeat flushing. Check for corrosion, dirt, loose connections.

- Propane Furnace: Yearly, Check for corrosion, dirt, loose connections.
- Refrigerator, Electric/propane: Monthly, Check for corrosion, dirt, loose connections. Check cooling tubes for yellow fluid leaking.

You might ask yourself, why is maintenance required on the above items? Most problems stem from corrosion, loose connections, dirt, dust and just plain neglect. The water heater is the biggest one. Failure to properly drain the water heater tank, can lead to the electric heating element to prematurely fail and reduce water temperature. This is all caused by buildup of calcium inside the tank.

Now, have I covered everything? Course not. What else, you might ask. Take a look around you, what do you see or really what items can't you see. Inverter/Charger, water pump, roof, belts on engine and generator, aerator on the sinks & shower heads, water filters, and air conditioner (a/c) return filter.

Ok, so I leave you with this, maintenance, good or bad?

2018 Alfa Owners Club Rally Held in Hemet, California

The 42nd annual Alfa Owners Club (AOC) Rally was held April 10th through 15th at the Golden Village Palms RV Resort in Hemet, California. Several of the AOC chapters held pre-rallies at the park starting in the week prior to the rally.

This was the first rally to be held in California in quite a few years. Approximately 80 coaches, both motor homes and 5th wheels, were in attendance. As always, many of the AOC attendees were also members of the AlfaSeeYas chapter.

Rally Masters Jim and Vonnie Beard, assisted by co-Rally Masters Craig and Nancy McDowell, put on a well-organized rally that had many activities on the schedule but still left time for socializing with friends, exploring the local area and enjoying the nice amenities offered at the Golden Village Palms park.

Several catered meals were provided in the park ballroom, starting with a welcome dinner sponsored by Redlands Truck and RV that included Hawaiian luau-style entertainment. Later in the rally the

OPINION - BYLINE BY RAY ZIMMERMANN IS THE RV INDUSTRY OUT-OF-TOUCH WITH RVERS?

I am a long-time reader of RV Travel

(rvtravel.com), a weekly newsletter that covers RVing from the perspective of RVers, as opposed to coach makers, dealers, associations, etc. The editor, Chuck Woodbury, has for the past few years been on a one-person crusade to point out some serious problems that are not covered elsewhere in the RV media. Specifically, the low quality of the products being cranked out by the manufacturers, and the fact that the thousands of new RVs being produced will be competing for a virtually unchanged number of RV park spaces. Chuck addressed this latter problem in a recent article, reprinted below, which should be of interest to those who love the RV lifestyle. The article also exemplifies Chuck's informative, entertaining writing style. You can find more of his articles at rvtravel.com. (The following is reprinted by permission.)

We posted an article [recently] from a periodical called SGB Executive. It quotes the president of the Recreation Vehicle Industry Association (RVIA), Frank Hugelmeyer.

In the article, Hugelmeyer offers his thoughts about the 2018 North American Camping Report, a survey commissioned by KOA that shows that more than six million new households have taken up RVing in the last three years. Using my basic math skills, I calculate that means two million new RV families a year or about 5,500 a day. That's roughly 228 an hour or just shy of four per minute.

Now let's figure there's perhaps a net gain of a few hundred RV park spaces **per year**. That comes to less than one a day.

Now, if I'm the president of an association that is paid a fee by manufacturers for every single RV product it sells, then I am pleased as punch that my organization is getting a cut on every one of the half million RVs sold in 2017. What the heck do I care where the buyers go with them?

The following statement from Frank is what really got me riled up and prompted my appearance here on my soapbox. In the *SGB* article he said: "Camping obviously is what everyone in an RV is doing."

Huh? Obviously?

I emailed him. I could not hold myself back. I had to know — did he really say that?

Dear Frank,

Did you really say this in the article I saw today from SGB Executive? "Camping obviously is what everyone in an RV is doing. . ."

You think someone in a 40-foot diesel pusher; or a two-bedroom, two bath fifth wheel with a wine cooler, residential fridge, built-in vacuum, dishwasher, heated floors, washer-dryer, cell phone booster, four TVs with a satellite receiver on the roof, stereo system. . . etc. — you really believe they are "**obviously** camping." Please!

Do you ever get away in an RV and see what it's like out there, where Baby Boomers, contract workers, the working poor, college students, traveling nurses, work campers and full-time millennials are clogging up RV parks?

You need to deep six the "go where you want, when you want" Go RVing slogan. It's not true anymore. Try getting a reservation within a month or two at any National Park. Try maybe a year ahead, and you might get a space if you're lucky." (end of letter)

BY THE WAY, check out Frank's Facebook or Twitter pages. You won't see any evidence of him in an RV, I couldn't even find a photo of an RV. I'd be surprised if he owns one or ever spent more a day or two in one (I could be wrong, of course). Does he realize that a crisis is coming where there's simply no place to stay with a big ol' power hungry RV except in the off-season or by making a reservation months or even years ahead?

Of course, there's always a Walmart parking lot. I dare the RVIA to run an ad showing RVers "camping" in parking lots. It'll never happen. Instead they show RVs camped on a bluff overlooking the ocean. Yeah, common practice, right?

Like I said, Frank didn't answer my email. No surprise. It's rare that anyone in the industry ever does — not just me, but other writers and bloggers with a voice to thousands of RVers, even tens of thousands, or in my case hundreds of thousands.

Here's what I think: There are still plenty of people who "camp" with RVs. They stay in state parks, national parks (ones off the beaten path because the popular ones are packed), and Forest

Service and BLM campgrounds. Some head off on a dirt road and plop down all alone in the desert or forest. But almost nobody, I suggest, who buys a 40-foot RV with an all-electric residential fridge and all the other things I explained to Frank, is camping. No way!

In the crowd where I hang out, which amounts to hundreds of thousands — if not a million people who live in their RVs full-time or seasonally — we do not camp. We "live." In my park here in Wichita Falls, 29 sites are occupied by long-term residents working on a local construction project. Are they camping? What about the other two dozen or more here who are full-timers like me? We are not camping, Frank, we are living in mobile homes that your RVIA member friends make more like transportable mansions every year! Who needs a bloody campfire when you have a built-in fireplace?

My RV is not an RV at all. "RV" stands for recreational vehicle. My RV is an "LV," a living vehicle. "Mobile home" works, too.

It's time for the industry to start treating RVers who camp and those with LVs differently, and try to do things to improve how we use their products — like lobbying local city councils who nix new RV park projects because they "don't want no trailer trash in the neighborhood." Treating me, and others like me, and young families who spend a weekend here and there in a small travel trailer alike is like lumping together a guy with a bass boat and a multimillionaire with a 70-foot yacht. Yes, they're both boaters, but what else do they have in common? Not much.

So what's my point? Not sure yet. I'll get to it one of these days. I think I need at least 500 hours to think it through. And then I'll write a book. First copy goes to Frank, my compliments.



Randy Scott found what he thought was a great article: "Tips on Stopping a Loose Dog from Approaching You" in an edition of the Whole Dog Journal. Northwest Wyoming in the Spring

If your "inner cowboy" (or cowgirl) is just hankering to get out, I know the perfect place for you to mosey off to - north western Wyoming! From the ever awesome Yellowstone National Park down to the cute towns of Cody, Greybull and Lovell Wyoming.

In June (an almost ideal time to visit) the little town of Lovell Wyoming holds it's annual *Wild Mustang Days* which includes a week-long celebration throughout the town. Experience a small town celebrating at its best by joining in on the pancake breakfasts, Follies at the Hobart Theater, the most fun parade down Main Street (it travels down both sides of the street) and of course, what would a western town be without a rodeo on Saturday evening.

Lovell is an easy drive to the Big Horn Canyon Recreation Area and a view that will knock your socks off! Seeing the river down below and the wild flowers up above there is no doubt, you will capture plenty of 'Kodak moments'. If you continue up 14A the road gets both winding and steep so I suggest you limit this scenic drive to your toad and not your RV. (Way up 14A you can turn off to the *Wyoming High Country Lodge* which is at about 8,000 feet elevation. They offer trail rides as well as lodging and some meals.)

Within the city limits of Lovell you will find both the *National Park Service Visitor Center* and the *Pryor Mountain Mustang Center*. Both are well worth a visit. The Park Service Center will tell you about what you can find within and around the Big Horn Recreation Area. This includes the breathtaking Devil's Canyon overlook! Prepare to ooh and ahh. The folks at the Mustang Center will tell you about the herd of wild mustangs roaming these hills. (*Hint*: Driving to the Canyon overlook means you might have an opportunity to view the mustangs in their natural environment!) The Mustang Center can also share the schedule of guided tours up in the Pryor Range with mustang spotting always on the agenda. (Our tour was cancelled due to thunderstorms so be prepared for possible cancellations.)

One of the main reasons we chose to stay at a wonderful campground in Greybull was that we could do a variety of things in and near Lovell; drive about 45 minutes to the 'big' city of Cody and all it offers visitors and by driving another half hour or so past Cody you enter one of the earliest U.S. National Parks - Yellowstone. Our campground was really close to everything!

June and July are good months to visit this area because spring is newly arrived, babies are being born but a word of caution - bears are coming out of hibernation. On our recent visit, Park Rangers were quite busy due to bear sightings and tourists not following park guidelines.

If you have never been to Yellowstone, be prepared to be awed. The vastness alone is unbelievable. Add in a mix of forests, wild flowers, vistas, waterfalls, geothermal activity almost everywhere and then, animals of all shapes and sizes. We definitely experienced a case of 'sensory overload'!

Just like us, other park visitors were also catching a glimpse of wildlife - a sure sign when the traffic in front of you comes to a halt. On our visit we saw bison everywhere! There were herds, pairs and single critters walking, eating and reclining. We saw moose and even a large elk munching greenery right alongside the road. I can't stress enough - stay IN your vehicles and take your pictures from a safe distance... This is **NOT** a zoo or a park!

At each of the 3 entrances to the park visitors receive a well-detailed map. The area is well worth a visit!



Many of us use the multi-segmented plastic trays we get at places like Camping World when we have meals served at our outings. One of our members has found a source for a paper version of the plastic ones which can be used once and thrown out (rather than having to wash the plastic ones). In addition, they are **biodegradable**. Our member ordered some and tried them out at several recent RV outings and they worked fine! **One hint:** if you are going to really load them up, it is suggested you use two - one on top of the other - and then just toss the top one out when done eating. If you go to the web site the current price is \$15.99 for 100, and \$45.99 for a case of 400. It looks like the shipping charge is rather high for 100, so a case is a better buy! Things to See and Do in the Hagerman, ID Area

Hagerman, ID is a small town (population of less than 1,000) located on the Snake River. It has a few restaurants, with others not too far away in nearby small towns. There are a number of activities in the area, and the larger city of Twin Falls is about 30 miles to the East. Further information on restaurants and local attractions can be found at the Hagerman RV Village web site, as well as using Yelp and Trip Advisor.

Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument. Explore a fossiliferous Pliocene-aged site! Do you know horses evolved in North America? The Hagerman Horse, Equus Simplicidens, is the first true horse. It's the park's most famous fossil but they have fossil evidence of over two hundred different species. From sabertoothed cat, mastodon, bear, camel, and ground sloth, to much smaller animals like rodents and frogs, the scientific study of Pliocene fossils is the key to Hagerman. In September, the Visitor Center will be open Thursday through Monday from 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. It is recommended you stop at the Visitor Center, located at 221 North State Street (Route 30) in Hagerman, to begin your visit. There you get the latest information, see an introductory movie, view fossils up close, and obtain maps and information about what there is to see and do in the area. www.nps.gov/hafo

Hagerman Valley Hot Springs. The Hagerman region has several natural hot springs that rise from the core of the Earth and provide mineral-rich hot water for all to enjoy.

Boating – Canoeing & Kayaking. The Snake River offers two reservoirs, Upper and Lower Salmon Falls, near Hagerman. Both have free boat launch facilities operated by either Gooding or Twin Falls County. Both reservoirs provide plenty of open water for water skiing or jet skiing, and fishing. The **1000 Springs Boat Tour** offers views of the Hagerman Valley and Thousand Springs area from onboard "The River's Mist" on Idaho's scenic Snake River. They have lunch and dinner cruises, as well as scenic cruises. They also offer kayak and paddleboard rentals. The **Idaho Guide Service** provides day tours, guide services, gear rentals, kayaking and canoeing, river rafting and tubing. The Hagerman Valley also is a non-motorized boater's dream with numerous lakes, ponds, and waterways to explore. Popular choices include the Billingsley Creek unit of Thousand Springs State Park, Ritter Island unit of Thousand Springs State Park, and the Snake River reservoirs.

Rafting. The Hagerman Section of the Snake River is located approximately 25 miles downstream from Twin Falls. This is a CLASS 3 trip with plenty of whitewater action and beautiful scenery. This stretch of the Snake

is known for its great fishing and plentiful natural springs that flow into the river from the Snake River Aquifer. Idaho Guide Service, Inc. has been running whitewater adventure trips since 1974, and were the first licensed outfitter on the Middle Snake River. www.idahoguideservice.com

Fishing. Excellent rainbow trout fishing can be found at Oster Lake 1 on the grounds of the Hagerman National Fish Hatchery. This is one of a series of ponds that extend into the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area. These ponds are stocked by the Idaho Department of Fish & Game for recreational fishing. The season is open from March to November. A wheelchair accessible dock is also available at Oster 1.

The Hagerman Valley Historical Society Museum: Located at corner of State St. and Highway 30, in Hagerman. Contains information and history on the Hagerman Valley, as well as artwork from a local artist. www.hagermanmuseum.com

Parks: Local parks include **Lower Salmon Falls Park** - with parking area and viewpoints for the river and hydroelectric dam; and **Malad Gorge State Park** which has a self-guided tour including a pedestrian bridge adjacent to I-84 that goes over the gorge and a waterfall.

History and Scenic Drives. Drive the 67-mile Thousand Springs Scenic Byway to get the full sight-seeing experience of the Thousand Springs region. It's a teachable moment for children and adults to learn that Thousand Springs are the outlet for the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer, a large freshwater resource that extends from St. Anthony to Hagerman. The pure waters from the aquifer are used to raise rainbow trout by multiple companies, including Clear Springs Foods, the largest producer of rainbow trout in North America, if not the world. www.visitsouthidaho.com/thousand-springs-scenic-byway

Wineries Include: Thousand Springs Winery Bed and Breakfast in Hagerman (www.thousandspringswinery.com) and Snyder Winery and Steakhouse in nearby Buhl, ID (www.snyder-winery.com).
