As of this writing, we do **not** have nominees for the Chapter Secretary or the Treasurer positions which brings me to the next topic.

I don't know how else to say this or get it across to each of you, so here goes. Members **must step up and be more involved**. Involvement comes in two forms – being a Chapter Rally Wagon Master AND being an officer on the Chapter's Executive Board. The Rally Wagon Master's and the leadership roles of this Chapter have been borne by a small fraction of the membership. This needs to change.

Regarding Chapter leadership, the Chapter has been active as a FMCA chapter for approximately 18 years and has had nine Boards. A Board of six officers is elected every 2 years. That equates to 54 officer positions that have been filled over those 18 years. Yet, only 23 individual members and, more importantly, only 17 member families, out of a membership that has ranged from well over 500 to approximately 150 members today, have stepped forward during those nine elections to keep this Chapter viable and active within the FMCA. To put it another way, each person who has been on the Board, has served an average of more than two terms (four plus years), and each family who has been on the Board, has served an average of more than three terms (six plus years). Either we get more people involved, or the Chapter will die a slow death. Randy and Ray have served on the Board far more than the rest of us. Ray has sold his Alfa motor home and will no longer be eligible to be a member of the AlfaSeeYas

or the FMCA. Randy has agreed to continue to be on the Board as the Vice President, but for only one more term. Therefore, these two stalwarts of the Chapter will no longer be there to pull our bacon out of the fire. **Members need to do the right thing and step up to be on the Board AND to be Chapter Rally Wagon Masters!**

Thanksgiving!

Thanksgiving - I really thought I knew the when, where and why but was I surprised to see what I didn't know!

Thanksgiving is celebrated as a national holiday in the United States, Canada, Brazil, Grenada, Saint Lucia and Liberia as well as in Leiden (Netherlands), Norfolk Island (Australia) and Puerto Rico.

It began as a day of giving thanks and sacrifice for the blessing of the harvest and of the preceding year.

A bit of history

Prayers of thanks and special thanksgiving ceremonies are common among almost all religions after harvest and at other times. The Thanksgiving holiday's history in North America is rooted in English traditions dating from the Protestant Reformation. It also has aspects of a harvest festival, even thought the harvest in New England occurs well before the late-November date on which the modern Thanksgiving holiday is celebrated.

The question of where the first Thanksgiving was held in the United States has been a subject of debate, primarily between New England and Virginia, complicated by the concept of Thanksgiving as a holiday celebration versus a religious service. The day for Thanksgiving services specifically codified in the founding charter of *Berkeley Hundred* in 1619 was instrumental in President John F Kennedy's attempt to strike a compromise between the regional claims, by issuing Proclamation 3560 On November 5, 1963, stating, "Over three centuries ago, our forefathers in Virginia and in Massachusetts, far from home in a lonely wilderness, set aside a time of thanksgiving. On the appointed day, they gave reverent thanks for their safety, for the health of their children, for the fertility of their fields, for the love which bound them together, and for the faith which united them with their God."


The first official, annual Thanksgiving in Canada was celebrated on 6 November 1879, though Indigenous peoples in Canada have a history of celebrating the fall harvest that predates the arrival of European settlers. Sir Martin Frobisher and his crew are credited as the first Europeans to celebrate a Thanksgiving ceremony in North America, in 1578. They were followed by the inhabitants of New France under Samuel de Champlain in 1606. The celebration featuring the uniquely North American turkey, squash and pumpkin was introduced to Nova Scotia in the 1750s and became common across Canada by the 1870s. In 1957, Thanksgiving was proclaimed an annual event to occur on the second Monday of

Paying tribute - Veteran's Day

On the morning of November 11, 1918, after four years of war, Allied and German powers met in Rethondes, France, to sign an armistice that halted the hostilities of World War I. The agreement was signed shortly after 5:00 a.m. and went into effect at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918, finally bringing to an end the carnage of the Great War - the war thought by many to be the war that would end all wars. One year later, on the first anniversary of the armistice, President Woodrow Wilson turned the nation's thoughts toward those who had sacrificed on America's behalf. He proclaimed the first Armistice Day, both to honor the services of the troops and to celebrate the opportunity that victory provided for the United States to advance the cause of peace and justice in the world.

The first Armistice Day was conceived as a day to be set aside for public parades, meetings and a two-minute suspension of all business activity at 11:00 a.m. Other countries also observed the day with many British Commonwealth nations using the red poppy - taken from John McCrae's poem, "In Flanders Fields" (1915) - to honor their fallen soldiers.

In 1921, the United States Congress approved the creation of the country's own *Tomb Of The Unknown Soldier* and set aside November 11 of that year as a federal holiday to honor all those who served in the war. At an Armistice Day ceremony officiated by President Warren G. Harding, an unidentified American soldier killed in France - "a soldier known but to God," as the tomb's inscription states - was laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. Five years later, on June 4, 1926, Congress, once again in the spirit of promoting international peace, passed a resolution that officially recognized the end of the Great War and encouraged the continued annual observance of Armistice Day.

Veteran's Day coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day which are celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

Veterans Day is distinct from Memorial Day, a U.S. public holiday in May. Veterans Day celebrates the service of all U.S. military veterans, while Memorial Day honors those who had died while in military service. Another military holiday that also occurs in May, Armed Forces Day, honors those currently serving in the U.S. military. Additionally, Women Veterans Day is recognized by a growing number of U.S. states that specifically honors women who have served in the U.S. military.
